ACHEBE, Chinua: THINGS FALL APART Greenwich: Fawcett Premier Publications. 1959

First US paperback edition. Signed by the author. Publishers original card covers. A good copy. The spine with a small nick without loss, some light reading creases and slightly rolled. The contents clean throughout and without previous owner's inscriptions or stamps. **£100**

Signed by Chinua Achebe in blue ink on the half title. The first volume of the author's masterful African Trilogy, followed by No Longer at Ease and Arrow of God. Widely considered the father of modern African literature, and the recipient of the Nigerian National Merit Award, Nigeria's highest accolade for intellectual achievement. In 2007 was awarded the Man Booker International Prize for lifetime achievement.

Whilst proud to have been asked to produce this catalogue of Martin's books, I cannot say I knew him well other than joining the annual scrum to buy books as he unpacked his stand at the London bookfair and for the last couple of decades being one or several steps behind him at antiquarian bookshops and fairs across Europe. This is therefore a fitting and an entirely familiar image of Martin for me, most often encountered as he walked away with books I would have bought and many I would never have recognised or thought to pick up, had I got there first.

As you are reading this catalogue, it's unlikely you will need an introduction to Martin Stone and his books. Since his death in 2016, he has been the subject of several affectionate memorials, securing his reputation as a legend of both the book trade and the world of music.

Martin's remarkable French books have been offered in two catalogues, most finding homes in private and institutional libraries. His English-language books are the subject of this new catalogue, which will be the last selection from his collection and stock.

All those who have had the honour of working with Martin's books have come to know him a little better and to appreciate his unique taste. He bought books he could sell, but he also bought them with the eye of a collector. Most have a story to tell, not always immediately apparent. His familiar pencil markings, neat and succinct, to a book's endpapers will sometimes give us a clue. In others, we are left to find out for ourselves. We've frequently asked ourselves, 'why did Martin have this?' and there's usually an interesting answer. Hopefully, you'll find something to add to your shelves.

Complete with the near fine original dustwrapper which is slightly creased at the top edge. Not price-clipped (7/6 net to the front flap). An attractive example. **£50**

A dystopian novel about the fight for liberty against an international monopolistic trust. (Bleiler).

ASTOR, John Jacob: A JOURNEY IN OTHER WORLDS. A Romance of the Future. *London: Longmans, Green, and Co.* 1894

First UK edition, first printing. Publisher's blue cloth decorated in silver with gilt titles to the upper board and spine. With 10 full page illustrations, 9 of which are by Dan Beard. A very good or better copy, the binding square and firm with a little rubbing and bumping to the spine tips and corners. The contents spotted to the tissue guard over the frontispiece are otherwise clean throughout and without previous owner's inscriptions or stamps.

A scientific romance set in the year 2000, with utopian strains and accounts of journeys to Jupiter and Saturn. The author, American businessman John Jacob Astor IV was a first class passenger on the Titanic, going down with it after first securing the safety of his wife. (Bleiler).

A play in five acts based on the lives of the founders of the Baha'i religion. The author was a leading American Baha'i teacher. She attended a boarding school founded by Marie Souvestre, a feminist educator who went on to mentor Eleanor Roosevelt and was the sister of Natalie Clifford Barney, an unashamedly unconventional writer and Parisian literary salon hostess who the character of Valérie in Radclyffe Hall's The Well of Loneliness is based on.

A novel portraying the United States in 1988 ruled by a ruthless financial oligarchy and peopled by an abject working class. One of the earliest works of dystopian fiction in the English language, it predicts developments such as radio, television and poison gas. The author, an American politician and amateur scientist is known primarily for his fringe theories concerning Atlantis (his 1882 book "Atlantis: The Antediluvian World", is credited with the considerable resurgence of interest in the legend of Atlantis in the late 19th / early 20th century) and Shakespearean authorship (he claimed to have deciphered a code discovered in Shakespeare's works that proved Francis Bacon to be the author of plays attributed to Shakespeare). [iv], 208pp. With 2 illustrations in black and white on page 4. A good or better copy. The fragile binding with splits, chips and flaking to the spine but holding. The contents in really very good condition, the pages clean throughout, without tears and without previous owner's inscriptions or stamps. Very scarce. **£950**

The third of "The Readies", printed in an edition of 300 copies issued by Bob Brown's newly established Roving Eye Press. This important anthology featured contributions from forty friends and fellow avant-gardists including Ezra Pound, Gertrude Stein, William Carlos Williams, F. T. Marinetti and Kay Boyle. The volume is also notable for Paul Bowles' first appearance in print and includes one of James T. Farrell's earliest stories.

In 1929, the Chicago born publisher and prolific author of pulp fiction, poetry and non-fiction Robert Carlton Brown and his

wife Rose temporarily settled in France where they became involved in the expatriate literary community in Paris. In the June 1930 issue of Transition, predicting that the printed book was bound for obsolescence, Brown announced that he had built a reading machine that would enable readers to "see words machine-wise". He established the Roving Eye Press, to promote his reading machine and publish his manifesto "The Readies" which promised to revolutionise reading by delivering to readers a radical new way to encounter texts in an integrated package encompassing both a device – his machine, and a medium – "The Readies" i.e. the Kindle (other electronic reading devices are available).

A work of speculative fiction imagining a world where Hitler won World War II. Written by two British journalists, one of which Christopher Serpell served in naval intelligence under Ian Fleming.

party" is loosely laid in). The first and only novel by Frank London Brown published in his short lifetime. However he contributed many shorter works and articles in periodicals such as Downbeat, Ebony, the Chicago Tribune and Sun-Times, Negro Digest, and the Chicago Review. Brown worked numerous jobs to support his literary ambitions, most significantly as an organiser and program officer for the United Packinghouse Workers of America and other labour unions. He was profoundly impacted by the musical culture of African American Chicago, most significantly jazz, but also gospel and blues. A devotee of bebop, Brown published a seminal interview with Thelonious Monk in Downbeat and pioneered in the reading of fiction to jazz accompaniment. His second novel "The Myth Maker" was published posthumously in 1969.

A utopian speculative fiction novel in which a 12th century monk is shown a series of visions of the future, leading up to a neo-medieval 21st century society where men and women have achieved complete equality. The author wrote a large number of feminist and gender-critical novels, also under the pseudonym of Murray Constantine and was undoubtedly far ahead of her time.

A rare pseudonymous novel by Katharine Burdekin, an important author of feminist and dystopian fiction who fell into literary obscurity for over forty years until she was rediscovered in the 1980s by the scholar and critic Daphne Patai. Patai was researching utopian texts and discovered that several novels written under the name Murray Constantine were actually attributable to Burdekin. This led to the re-publication of two Constantine novels: Swastika Night (first published by Gollancz in 1937 and re-published in 1985) and in 1993 this novel in which a transgender human from the future visits England in the 1930s and "offers an incisive critique of the politics of privilege, violence, and militarism in the West".

The Pugs and Peacocks in the title being familiar features of Ottoline Morrell's home, Garsington Manor, a centre of pacifist discussion and refuge for Bloomsbury Conscientious Objectors working on the land, which thinly disguised, provides one of the settings in the novel.

The very scarce true first edition of Cooper's adventure of the sea, published in London three days after this Paris printing and not until early January the following year in America. With the characters of Scipio Africanus and Cassandra, the novel presents some of the first serious depictions of characters of African lineage in American literature. Adaptations for the stage in both the United States and England followed shortly after publication.

Detroit native Ralph Cheever Dunning, labelled "the living Buddha of Montparnasse" by fellow American expatriate Ford Maddox Ford, was a silent, wraith-like presence in vital, literary Paris in the 1920s. Arriving in Paris around 1905 he dedicated his life to honing a small group of poems using the style, language and verse forms of the late Victorian era. While contemporary critics derided his "hopelessly antiguated" philosophy and mode of expression, Ezra Pound joined others in championing his work seeing to it that the reluctant poet was published in the most important journals of the day, culminating in his winning the Helen Haire Nevinson Prize from Poetry magazine in 1925. More interested in writing poetry than in seeing it published, the reclusive opium addict appeared equally unmoved by critics and admirers. Dunning rarely ate and rarely spoke and when he did venture out, would be found in the noisiest cafés on the Left Bank, clutching a glass of warm milk and a book. Dunning's poetry reflected his own profound death wish, emphasising how life is fleeting, death permanent. That wish was fulfilled, aged 52, when weakened by tuberculosis, he simply stopped eating altogether.

In 1926 the New York Times described de Wolfe as "one of the most widely known women in New York social life" and in 1935, Paris experts named her the best-dressed woman in the world, noting that she wore what suited her best, regardless of fashion. The author William Beebe is regarded as one of the founders of the field of ecology, as well as one of the early 20th century's major advocates of conservation. A well-known figure in the Roaring Twenties of New York City he was more famous in the United States than any other American naturalist prior to the days of television.

Carswell was a talented writer in her own right. In a rather strange tale likely invented by Shiel, Shiel's father claimed a small Caribbean island called Redonda and announced himself king, passing the title on to his son who then passed it to Gawsworth who styled himself 'King Juan'. The kingdom and its titles have become something of a literary in-joke, its 'nobility' growing to include a large number of literary figures and creatives and continues to be added to in the present day.
